HPHS "Burn Book" Makes New York Times Best Seller List

HIGHLAND PARK—The HPHS *Burn Book*, penned in the traditional Mean Girls style by an HPHS student, has unexpectedly spearheaded a literary revolution by becoming a New York Times best seller.

The Burn Book, which contains snide remarks about a number of members of the Highland Park community, has been flying off bookshelves since it was published at HPHS a few weeks ago. Despite its blunt phraseology and controversial decision to use real names and events, The Burn Book has received critical acclaim by people such as J.K. Rowling, Oprah Winfrey, and Regina George.

Consider this my holiday present to you. Save the gift receipt.




