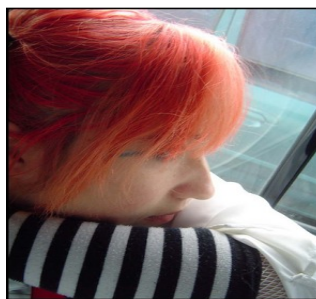
"Be yourself and dye your hair," Carrie Ramsey tells Flipside reporters. "Tell your friends that you are different and special in your own way. Do it."

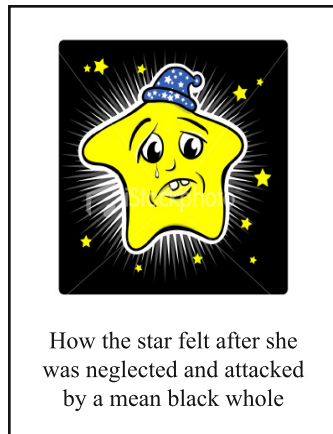
